Our Call to be a Secular Franciscan

This month we continue our stories of the path that led us to recognizing our call to become secular Franciscans. This is the story of Lea, who has been professed for over 35 years.

As a child, a relative was a Third Order member whose group met at St. Peter's in the Loop and this inspired me. (*Prior to Vatican II and the new rule of 1978, secular Franciscans were called Third Order members or Tertiaries which is Latin for third.*)

While being taught by Franciscan sisters at Alvernia High School, I became attracted to their manner of following their faith in Jesus.

I worked downtown doing a civil service job and would pass by St. Peter's Church every day going to and from work. I truly loved my job. I lived on the northwest side of Chicago and eventually traveled to St. Peter's for the three years during my formation process to become a secular Franciscan. I was professed in the 1980's.

During bad weather, I found it difficult to travel to St. Peter's because I had far to walk. So I transferred to a closer fraternity, St. Juliana's fraternity. When it became difficult to use public transportation to attend the meetings, I was put on shut-in status.

I live in a Franciscan community. I go to daily Mass and am a Eucharistic Minister. I live an active and full life but missed my Franciscan fraternity brothers and sisters.

When I was accepted into this fraternity, I was very happy and I look forward to helping and being more active with all the members. I thank God for my personal family and my secular Franciscan family...you.
