Our Call to be a Secular Franciscan

This month we continue our stories of the path that led us to recognizing our call to become secular Franciscans. This is the story of Mary Kay, who will celebrate the 14th Anniversary of her profession in November.

Isaiah 58:9 "Then you shall call, and the Lord will answer, you shall cry for help, and He will say: Here I am!"

I will begin my story at the end, the end of my former life.

I moved back to Arlington Heights, my childhood hometown, after the end of a very long, difficult marriage. There was relief, but after being a wife and mother, I felt I had lost my identity.

One sleepless night in a house I now shared with no one, I cried to God literally, that I was lost, I was alone, I was fearful of my future.

I didn't realize at the time that He was listening. The next morning, a Sunday, I felt a peace I hadn't known for a long time. I went to Mass in the church where I had spent my growing up years. One of the hymns the choir sang was *Be Not Afraid*. Afterwards, just leafing through the parish bulletin, a notice jumped off the page. "Come to an Open House about the Secular Franciscans." I wrote the date and time on my kitchen calendar.

And the rest is...no, not history, but the beginning. The beginning of a spiritual journey and a future I could never have imagined.

My spirit has been awakened and is always being renewed in the Secular Franciscan Order. My profession opened the door to my soul. In came the Holy Spirit and the support and love, through Jesus Christ, of my Brothers and Sisters in fraternity.

God called me out of darkness into a new light, a new beginning. I am never alone!

The First Secular Franciscans Blessed Luchesio Modestini and Buonadonna di (d. 1260) Feast Day – April 28th

Luchesio and his wife Buonadonna wanted to follow St. Francis as a married couple. They helped set in motion the Secular Franciscan Order.

Luchesio was a merchant in the little town of Poggibonzi in Tuscany. More than most merchants, he was so entirely and solely concerned with material success that he was generally reputed to be an avaricious man. His wife, Buonadonna, was of a similar disposition.

Meeting Francis—probably in 1213—changed his life. The grace of God touched him and he realized how foolish it is to strive only for worldly goods, of which he could take nothing with him to eternity, meanwhile forgetting about his soul's salvation. He began to practice works of mercy and to perform his religious obligations with fidelity.

At first Buonadonna was not as enthusiastic about giving so much away as Luchesio was.

One day after complaining that he was giving everything to strangers, Buonadonna answered the door only to find someone else needing help. Luchesio asked her to give the poor man some bread. She frowned but went to the pantry anyway. There she discovered more bread than had been there the last time she looked. And the finest bread at that. She soon became as zealous for a poor and simple life as Luchesio was.

Since they had no one to care for but themselves and Luchesio feared that in conducting his business he might relapse into covetousness, he gave up his business entirely. He and his wife divided everything among the poor and kept for themselves only so much acreage as they needed for their support. Luchesio tilled this with his own hands.

(In the 13th century some couples, by mutual consent and with the Church's permission, separated so that the husband could join a monastery--or a group such as Francis began--and his wife could go to a cloister. Conrad of Piacenza and his wife did just that. This choice existed for the childless or for those whose children had already grown up.)

Luchesio and Buonadonna wanted another alternative, a way of sharing in religious life, but outside the cloister.

About this time St. Francis came to Tuscany. After his sermon on penance, hosts of people desired to heave all and enter the convent. But the saint admonished them calmly to persevere in their vocation, for he had in mind soon to give them a special rule according to which they could serve God perfectly even in the world.

At Poggibonzi, Francis visited Blessed Luchesio and greatly rejoiced to find this avaricious man so altered. Luchesio asked for special instructions for himself and his wife, so that they might lead a life in the world that would be pleasing to God.

St. Francis explained to them his plans for the establishment of an order for lay people, and Luchesio and Buonadonna asked to be received into it at once. Thus, according to tradition, they became the first members of the Order of Penance, which later came to be called the Third Order of St. Francis. To meet this desire, Francis set up the Secular Franciscan Order. Francis wrote a simple Rule for the Third Order (Secular Franciscans) at first. In 1221, Cardinal Ugolino prepared in legal form a rule which Pope Honorius III approved verbally. For this reason the year 1221 is often given as the date of the founding of the Third Order of St. Francis.

After Luchesio had put on the gray garment of a Tertiary, he rapidly advanced toward perfect holiness. The charity of Luchesio drew the poor to him, and, like many other saints, he and Buonadonna seemed never to lack the resources to help these people.

When a plague raged in Poggibonzi and the surrounding places, Luchesio went out with his laden donkey to bring necessities to the sick. When he did not have enough to supply all, he begged for more from others on behalf of the distressed.

One day Luchesio was carrying a crippled man he had found on the road. A frivolous young man came up and asked, "What poor devil is that you are carrying there on your back?" "I am carrying my Lord Jesus Christ," responded Luchesio. The young man immediately begged Luchesio's pardon.

The time had come when the faithful servant of God was to receive the reward for his good works. When he lay very ill, and there was no hope for his recovery, his wife said to him, "Implore God, who gave us to each other as companions in life, to permit us also to die together."

Luchesio prayed as requested. Buonadonna fell ill with a fever, from which she died even before her husband, after receiving devoutly the holy sacraments.

Luchesio and Buonadonna both died on April 28, 1260. He was beatified in 1273. Local tradition referred to Buonadonna as "Blessed" though the title was not given officially.

At his grave in the Franciscan church in Poggibonzi, many miracles have occurred. His continuous veneration as Blessed was approved by Pope Pius VI. **T**

Glimpses of the Past

While going through some old files, your minister found these interesting items in the fraternity newsletter from **March 1992**. Twenty-seven years ago, our fraternity had **51** active members.

The per capita (Fair Share) donation per member was 12.
