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# Our Call to be a Secular Franciscan

This month we continue our stories of the path that led us to recognizing our call to become secular Franciscans. This is the story of our Sister Cyndy.

My good friend Sue and I met in 2003 as we entered the Called & Gifted Lay Ministry Program through the Archdiocese of Chicago. We graduated in 2005 and decided that as a graduation gift to ourselves we would take a trip! Rome was the obvious place, the heart and head of our religion. Sue was really into St. Francis, so we also needed to get to Assisi. All I knew about him at that time was that he loved animals.

Let me step back and say that our Program Director for the C&G handed out St. Francis Holy cards to us, gave us a San Damiano cross on a chain and a San Damiano pin to wear. When we had our monthly formation days out at the seminary, the environment set up always included a large San Damiano Cross. Again this meant nothing to me and our program director never really talked about St. Francis, maybe he assumed we knew as much as he did. The original San Damiano cross, currently hangs in the Santa Chiara (St.Clare) Church in **Assisi.** 

Stepping into this church the first time, I did not expect to see the San Damiano Cross, this was a very moving experience and we went to this church more than once on our own.

The priests on this trip, one Franciscan and one Dominican, held an informal gathering so that fellow pilgrims could get to know them and one another a little better. They also explained their role and commented that they were here for our spiritual needs while on this pilgrimage.

After dinner on our first night in Assisi, I was moved to ask our Franciscan priest, Friar Johnpaul, if he and I could talk. I told him I needed to do this tonight or tomorrow night, but before we got to Rome and before I lost my nerve. I guess I needed to have a clean soul before entering Rome. After all, Rome is the head of our church. Little did I know, until I experienced it, yes, Rome is the head of our church but Assisi is where I experienced the spirituality of our Religion.

Anyway, it was a solid 15-minute walk straight up the hill to the Piazza in Assisi. I remember talking all around the issue I wanted to discuss, but I still didn't give up anything as I wasn't yet sure I'd be making a confession. Walking through the quaint medieval streets of Assisi we came to the Piazza del Commune. This was the center of life for the town, a place St. Francis often walked, laughed and sang with his friends, and felt God's powerful love especially after his own conversion. Looking back, I now know St. Francis was there with me on this special night as was the Holy Spirit!

Once up at the Piazza we found an outside café where we could sit. After I poured out my heart, our Friar reflected back to me the essence of what I had shared, the pain of what I had carried and the truth of what I had come to know. He also reminded me that I had already been forgiven by God. Now I needed to forgive myself!

When I was finally ready to accept forgiveness and at the exact moment of absolution, I physically felt this dark painful secret/sin flutter out of the left side of my head where I had "stored" it, for lack of a better word. Soon afterwards, I was exhausted and headed back to the hotel. Sue was already in the room and

wanted to know if everything was OK. I told her that our Friar and I had a good talk and now I just needed to take a shower and go to bed.

As soon as I got into the shower and turned on the water I had a physical meltdown, I broke into tears and sobbed and cried out loud. The pain that I had been carrying around with me was so fully replaced by God's love and mercy that it overwhelmed my human body and it entered into the only other place it could go, my spirit! This physical meltdown/Spiritual high continued daily for almost three months. This was God's way of continuing to engage me, of giving me this awesome gift of His presence in my life. It eventually tapered off from daily to weekly to no more.

My spiritual director Fr. Bob, early on told me not to expect this to continue to happen. He said some people never get to experience this in their lives, some experience it only once and some after they experience it once expect to feel God's presence this intensely all the time and they are greatly dissatisfied and feel let down by God when it doesn't happen. I was fortunate to have someone tell me not to ever expect it again but if I do receive this gift again that is exactly what it is, a gift from God.

My friend Sue and now my Franciscan sister knew about the OFS as she had family members who were Secular Franciscans. I started learning more about St. Francis and OFS and told Sue I was interested in taking another journey with her, and hoped she was, too. We were professed into the order on October 11, 2010. It was and continues to be a wonderful journey. Sister Cyndy, OFS
