WELCOME KIT PROJECT

The staff of FRANCISCAN OUTREACH was delighted and grateful for the Welcome Kit that Sister Kay and her husband took down to them.

After a long period of transition work between the staff at Franciscan Outreach and a homeless person, at least 28 homeless people have jobs and have been placed in apartments of their own in 2019 and given a Welcome Kit. So the need is great.

Providing completed WELCOME KITS to Franciscan Outreach for those transitioning from homelessness into living in an apartment is our new **ONGOING** project for the entire fraternity. Attached to this newsletter is a list of the items needed for one kit.

Sister Faith, oFS, eagerly and graciously offered to lead this ministry. Sister Faith will have SIGN-UP SHEETS FOR EACH KIT. Throughout the year, look for sales on these items and purchase them. When you do so, let Sister Faith know what you have bought and she will add it to a list—or lists, if you buy more than what is required for one kit. KEEP THE ITEMS AT HOME UNTIL NEEDED.

For example, Marion found a ridiculously low price for sets of good white dishes and purchased 3 sets. One was used for the kit we packed in October. The other two will be noted on the lists that Faith has for future kits.

When a list is full, Sister Faith will let us know and we will bring the items to the next meeting and pack the kit which will then be taken down to Franciscan Outreach. **T**

Our Call to be a Secular Franciscan

This month we continue our stories of the path that led us to recognizing our call to become secular Franciscans. This is the story of our Sister Geri.

> My Calling to My Secular Franciscan Vocation

May 13, 2013, was the day of my Profession in the Secular Franciscans. Little did I know how my life would be forever changed, enriched, and blessed. You see, God has to hit me over the head, sometimes, to have me get His message.

Initially, some dear friends exposed me to the awareness of the Secular Franciscans. At that time in my life I was committed to my parish Youth Group. When I hung up my involvement with the Youth, I then decided I could pursue my desires with the Secular Franciscans.

If you noticed, I said I could do it...I never considered this a calling to my vocation. It was just another commitment that I was going to be involved in.

I loved going through formation, but, once again, I was anxious to get on with the

profession. God bless Sue for her patience as at the time knowing it would take three years, I thought I may not live that long!. But then, at the end of formation, I didn't want to come out of my cocoon.

Through my formation, I learned the history of our Beloved Father Francis, and that of St. Clare, which touched me forever with their deep devotion to Jesus.

In his early life, Francis had an aversion to those afflicted with leprosy and it took great courage to overcome this aversion. I began to identify with my "lepers" and, through prayer and love of the Liturgy of the Hours, which didn't come easily at first, I began my intense Franciscan journey. As my love grew deeper in my vocation, I began to attend daily Mass. Six-thirty a.m. Mass was never a friend to me and still isn't today.

I also grew in my devotion to Our Blessed Mother which I had since childhood. I came across the book, *30 Day Retreat with Our Blessed Mother* by Michael Gaitley. This also changed my life. After finishing my first round of retreat, Our Blessed Mother revealed to me that many significant days of my life had occurred on her feast days...this blew me away.

My day of profession, May 13, was the same day as my First Communion, the same day that Pope St. John Paul II was shot, the same day that Our Lady first appeared to the children at Fatima. Of course, not all in the same year. My husband died on the feast of Our Lady of Lourdes which was very significant as he had really missed his mother after her death. He was greeted into eternity by Our Lady, his first mother. My mother died on the feast day of St. Catherine Labouré, to whom Our Lady appeared and gave the Miraculous Medal. On March 25th of that year, Good Friday, I suffered a fracture of my vertebrae. I realized that these were forms of suffering to grow from and endure with His love. Being a secular Franciscan isn't for sissies.

On my actual profession day I was overwhelmed with the Holy Spirit as I then realized that I was truly called by God and it wasn't another activity to which I chose to donate my time.

Through these past six years, it has been an amazing love journey—a love story where I have become aware of how deeply I am loved by God and the beauty of my Franciscan vocation.

I never knew the limitless love of our Lord for each of us. He is just out of this world with His abundant love and mercy which He gives to us when we let go. I never knew the freedom that comes with letting go of my ways, and His wonderful sense of humor when He humbly allows me to fall say "Okay, God, have it your way," realizing that His mercy covered over my pride.

Thank you for allowing me to share this walk with you and for listening.

Please know that while our balance looks very healthy, one half of it must be kept in the bank account to avoid paying the ridiculous monthly fees which will be charged if the balance falls under \$1,500. even for one day.

Also, there will not be a separate collection in 2020 for the Fair Share payment that is made each year to support the Regional and National Fraternities. Fair Share will come out of the Common Fund. That will reduce the balance considerably. An in-depth explanation will be in the December or January issues of the newsletter.

NAFRA Border Outreach Project

Las Cruces, New Mexico - Mi Casa, Su Casa

At a time of crisis, the Reserve Center (in Las Cruces) has become a way station for thousands of asylum seekers from Mexico, about an hour away.

...There are plenty of Las Crucians who disagree with the government policy of accepting asylum seekers, and the U.S. Customs and Border Protection has dropped more than 17,000 refugees in Las Cruces since last April for initial processing. But, from the start, Las Cruces has seen its role in purely humanitarian terms. "We're all focused on doing one thing: Let's take care of the needs of these people right now," says Fred Espinosa, a pastor at the Las Cruces First Assembly of God Church.

Residents have hosted their own donation drives and they open their homes and businesses to people needing a place to stay. They also volunteer as interpreters, medical and legal advisors, and guides.

"I'm very proud to be a resident of the city of Las Cruces, to see this community come together, from nonprofits to volunteers to the city of Las Cruces, Doña Ana County, and faithbased organizations together as one," says fire department chief Eric Enriquez. **T**
