Our Call to be a Secular Franciscan

This month we continue our stories of the path that led us to recognizing our call to become secular Franciscans. This is the story of our Sister Kav.

Awareness of secular Franciscans started early in my life. When I was about four of five years old, my next door neighbor occasionally came to babysit. When she came over, I noticed her "funny belt". She explained to me that it was a cincture. She wore it she said because she was a Tertiary, a third order Franciscan.

School started. Guess which order of nuns taught at our school? Franciscan. The nuns were spectacular, warm, funny and just wonderful human beings. The feast of St. Francis became a week of celebrations.

Time passed, and I started college. I thought about becoming a nun. Just about that time I met my husband. God had other ideas.

Now jump ahead to 1998. We had just moved to Palatine. As part of settling into parish life, I became a member of a Bible Study group at St. Thomas of Villanova. Sister Eddie was part of this group. Both she and I brought Communion to nursing homes and the hospital. We were part of the same rosary group. What a great mentor!

Thus began a journey to become a Secular Franciscan.

Fair Share

Fair Share is what a fraternity is asked to contribute as a whole to support the regional, national and international fraternities.

There have been many misconceptions about the Fair Share in past years. It is not "dues" owed by each fraternity member. Paving it does not mean that one is automatically an active member in good standing in a fraternity. No one is required to pay a set amount to stay a member of the fraternity.

Article 25 of the Rule states:

Regarding expenses necessary for the life of the fraternity and the needs of worship, of the apostolate, and of charity, all the brothers and sisters should offer a contribution according to their means. Local fraternities should contribute toward the expenses of the higher fraternity councils.

Each year, every local fraternity contributes a set amount to the Mother Cabrini regional council. In turn, the regional council contributes a set amount to the national fraternity to cover its expenses.

In past years, local fraternities have asked for a separate amount from each fraternity member for Fair Share. This will not be the practice in the future. The contribution to the region will be taken out of the Common Fund and will be sent to the regional council by March 1, 2020. **T**

ONE SOLITARY LIFE

This is a popular poem about the life of Jesus Christ. Although the author is frequently cited as "unknown", the poem is actually attributed to James Allen Francis.

He was born in an obscure village, the child of a peasant. He grew up in another village, where he worked in a carpenter shop until he was 30. Then, for three years, he was an itinerant preacher.

He never wrote a book. He never held an office. He never had a family or owned a home. He didn't go to college. He never lived in a big city. He never traveled 200 miles from the place where he was born. He did none of the things that usually accompany greatness. He had no credentials but himself.

He was only 33 when the tide of public opinion turned against him. His friends ran away. One of them denied him. He was turned over to his enemies and went through the mockery of a trial. He was nailed to a cross between two thieves. While he was dying, his executioners gambled for his garments, the only property he had on earth. When he was dead, he was laid in a borrowed grave, through the pity of a friend.

Twenty centuries have come and gone, and today he is the central figure of the human race. I am well within the mark when I say that all the armies that ever marched, all the navies that ever sailed, all the parliaments that ever sat, all the kings that every reigned—put together—have not affected the life of man on this earth as much as that One, Solitary Life.
