Our Call to be a Secular Franciscan

This month we continue our stories of the path that led us to recognizing our call to become secular Franciscans. This is the story of our Brother Tim.

I was a junior in high school and we were all talking about after high school plans. Whether we were going to college or straight into a job. I wasn't all that sure exactly what I wanted to do yet, besides my life long dream of becoming a letter carrier through the post office. I had always been really close and involved with my parish from ushering to being a Eucharistic minister to being in a youth group, trying to get more people to join and being involved in church activities.

Ever since I was a child I had always enjoyed joining my grandparents in coming to their monthly gathering. So I knew that God had been sending me a calling. I always felt that I was being called to be a priest. One day my grandfather accompanied me downtown to St. Joseph's seminary to seek my discernment in becoming a priest. It came to the conclusion that I had to go for 8 more years of school, 4 years at St. Joseph's and the other 4 years at Mundelein seminary.

After hearing this news I was like "oh man 8 more years of school". I didn't want to do that as bad as that sounds.

A few years went by and I graduated high school and was still getting involved in a lot of different activities. Thinking after those few years after my visit to the seminary that my calling had slipped through my fingers, but yet I still felt I was being called to something but what could it be??? Somehow I don't remember how, but I got involved with the pro life group at St. John Cantius. Two years straight I went to the March for life in Washington D.C. with the brothers of St. John Cantius; my second year I was made a chaperone. It brought to me this wonderful idea, maybe my calling was to become a brother. I got in touch with Brother Chad, he told me what I would have to do. I scheduled myself a weekend to come and stay at St. John Cantius and follow the schedule the brothers do. I had an absolute blast and didn't want to go back home.

My last day came and I had only one more task I had to do, which was to have an interview with the Pastor. Father Phillips and I sat down and talked about how I liked the visit and what my thoughts were. I told him I loved it and what would my next steps be before I am considered?

He asked me if I had any medical conditions. I told him I had a pre-existing heart condition (Pulmonary Stenosis). Basically the valve keeps opening irregularly and the valve regurgitates fluid, which at some point would need to be repaired. The doctors all said that there had been no change at every three year check up. Father had told me he would have to pass it by the council before they could make a final decision.

A few days went by. I received an email from Father Phillips stating the council had denied my request to become a brother. I was so disappointed that once again my calling had slipped through my fingers.

It was about a year later and I know I still had this calling, I had been with my grandparents

at their monthly gathering. During social time, my grandfather had asked why don't I consider joining the order? I thought, "Why didn't I think about this sooner?"

What I had been intensely searching for had been in front of my face this whole time. I asked Jackie about joining. She handed me the book *Francis and the Dream*. I studied it and felt that this was right for me. I decided to join the fraternity.

It has been four years since my profession and I am currently serving on the council and could not be happier. This is my home, my family, my future and mostly serving the Lord as he has called me.
