THE PERSON JESUS LOVES

As the worshipers arrived on a late November morning at the Lutheran Church in White Lake, North Dakota, they were met by a rather disturbing sight.

An apparently homeless beggar sat on the front steps of the church, wearing tattered clothing, a wool cap pulled down over his eyes, and clutching a bottle in fingerless gloves. They had never seen anything quite like this in White Lake, North Dakota.

Most worshipers simply walked around the man, or stepped over him, as he sat there. Some muttered words of disapproval, and others suggested that the man move to another doorway before the Sunday School children arrived. One member told the man, in no uncertain terms, that the Salvation Army in Minot was a more appropriate place to sleep it off.

At one point, a kind woman brought the man a Styrofoam cup of hot coffee, but not one person asked the man to come in out of the cold, and certainly nobody invited him in to join them in worship.

Imagine, then, the people's surprise during the processional, when their homeless friend made his way into the pulpit, took off his cap, and the people recognized that it was their pastor! A God Flash

V.I.R.U.S.

St. Francis of Assisi was the virus of the 13th century.

Sound shocking? Because our minds are programmed to think of a virus as only being something "bad". Couldn't there be "good" viruses, too?

What is a virus? One definition is: a small piece of genetic material surrounded by a protein shell. Viruses are so small that a microscope is necessary to visualize them, and they have a very simple structure.

Doesn't that sound like a good definition of our Father Francis? He only sought to be a very small, unseen, simple part of creation surrounded by the shell of God's Love.

However, it wasn't long before his simple way and the joy it created "infected" others. They were eager to join him. He began to understand that God meant for him to infect others by sharing with them his love for God and all of His creatures and creation.

A virus cannot live long by itself. It must find a host to which it attaches itself. The virus penetrates the host and turns it into a replica of itself.

Was there ever a better replica of St. Francis than St. Clare? From them, multitudes of men and women were infected with the desire to live their lives in the simple way that Jesus taught. The way of the Gospels.

Men became brothers and, beginning in Italy, communities spread like wildfire across Europe. Women hurried to join Clare and founded monasteries throughout Italy and other countries.

Others longed to follow in their footsteps but could not because of the responsibilities of their lives. The Brothers and Sisters of Penance was born, another replication of the virus that began with Father Francis.
