Dear Brothers and Sisters,

I would like to introduce myself to you, my name is **Brother Ed Arambasich**, **OFM**, a native to the city of Joliet, IL. Most of my early life as a grade school kid and high school youth, I loved working with the Benedictine sisters that taught me for seven years and then we transferred Catholic Schools to St. John the Baptist School and Parish, Joliet, where I was introduced to the Franciscan friars and the Carmelite friars at Joliet Catholic High School. Guidelines for Fraternity Life During Social Distancing

Until such time as fraternity life can return to a more normal way, the International Fraternity has determined guidelines to be used by all fraternities. This is a summary:

Rite of Admission

The Rite of Admission takes place within a liturgical celebration (not Mass) and cannot be done virtually. It is possible to have the Rite, if a small group representing the fraternity can be assembled.

Rite of Profession

The Rite of Profession needs to be delayed until the fraternity can gather for two reasons:

- 1. According to General Constitutions, the Council needs to decide *by secret ballot* on admission to profession of each candidate
- 2. The Fraternity needs to be present to witness the profession

Fraternity Council Elections

Fraternity members, the appointed Presider and Ecclesial Witness must be physically present for an election. Elections involve voting by secret ballot, and this cannot happen by teleconference phone or email.

Mail in ballots are not acceptable for the following reasons: the reading of the ballots must be overseen by the Presider and Ecclesial Witness, and there are multiple elections and a changing slate. Elections that cannot be held safely must be postponed.

Our fraternity is scheduled for Fraternity Council Elections in September 2021.

Official Fraternity Visitations

Fraternity members and the Visitor(s) must be physically present for an official Visitation. An official Visitation cannot take place by teleconference. Visitations that cannot be held safely must be postponed.

Our fraternity had its official Visitation in March just before social distancing took effect.

Fraternity Transfers

If a secular Franciscan requests a transfer to another fraternity, but did not physically visit the new fraternity several times before social distancing went into effect this year, the transfer request is put on hold until all requirements are met. The secular Franciscan remains a member of the original fraternity in the interim.

Other Guidelines

A few other guidelines mentioned are in sync with what we have been doing as a fraternity to keep our fraternal life active through Virtual gatherings or gatherings following local social distancing norms.

Glad Tidings

The following is taken from the Fall/Winter 2020 Graymoor Today, publication of Franciscan Friars of the Atonement (At-one-ment) in Garrison, NY. I am sure that Fr. Bob Warren, will not mind my sharing his experience.

"Several years ago, just before Christmas, I stopped at a diner for a quick meal. When I entered it was nearly empty, but shortly a family entered. As they sat down, I heard their toddler squeal. His face was alive with glee. He giggled with excitement.

"Then I saw the source of his merriment—a tattered rag of a coat, dirty worn baggy pants, spindly body with toes that poked out of wouldbe shoes, knotted greasy hair and a tired worn face. The man spoke loudly across the room. 'Hi there, baby. Hi there, big boy. I see you.'

"The parents exchanged looks of 'what do we do' and 'that poor man'. Then the man began shouting, 'Do you know patty cake? Do you know peek-a-boo?' The baby squealed louder creating even more disturbance. The parents were clearly embarrassed and uncomfortable with the interaction. They tried to distract the baby. 'Eric, leave the man alone, he's eating. Here Eric, play with this.'

"Nevertheless, Eric was enraptured with the man dressed in rags and continued throughout the meal to reach out to him. I couldn't help wonder WHY? The family hurried through their meal, paid and bolted for the door. As they passed the man's table, Eric flung himself from his mother's arms towards his new friend.

"The old man stood up and caught him. Eric laid his head on the old man's ragged shoulders, hugging him tightly. The man's eyes closed and I saw tears rolling down his cheeks. His aged hands full of grime and pain and hard labor held that baby so very gently. Then his eyes opened and he handed the baby back to his mother and said in a whisper, 'God bless you, ma'am. Take good care of this child. He gave me my Christmas....'

"I suggest that the meaning of Christmas is Eric. Eric is the God figure, the Christ Child, filled with zeal and love for us tattered people with our tattered lives, our tattered hurts, our tattered relationships and our tattered sins. God, like little Eric, always has his arms out-stretched towards us, determined to break into our lives. God, like Eric, embraces the least likely, often the ones others would like to avoid.

"Look at the first people called to the stable—poor shepherds and foreigners. Shepherds were considered lowly outcasts. The wise men were outsiders, pagans and not trusted. Of all the people in the world, god chose the outcasts and the foreigners to be the first to receive the astonishing news that God would become human." With hearts full of gratitude.
